RECOMMENDATION	Staff recommended approval. The Little Rock Planning Commission voted 8 for, 0 nays, and 3 absent to approve the changes.	
BACKGROUND	Staff initiated the process to revise the ordinance in 2016, and routinely keeps track of items that are possible ordinance amendments and the Design Review Committee added the following additional changes: 1) editing the word "prohibited"; 2) changes to internally lit signs; 3) projecting sign changes; 4) sandwich board sign changes; 5) backfill topsoil requirements; and 6) street tree species change.

BACKGROUND CONTINUED

The sandwich board sign section has been rewritten. The backfill topsoil requirements have been changed to help alleviate pavers from sinking and lifting up which creates tripping hazards. The street tree change was proposed by Parks & Recreation to alleviate structurally unsound issues and the general non-suitability of the Autumn Blaze Maple trees as street trees. Staff provided four (4) choices to the River Market Design Review Committee for their review along with pros and cons of each tree.

One citizen, Jo Melton, property owner, attended the Planning Commission and spoke on the issue.
