BOB TURNER RETIRES FROM CITY HALL

Assistant City Manager, Former Public Works Director Concludes over 3 Decades of Service

After serving in three key leadership positions in Little Rock City Government, **Bob Turner** announced his retirement as Assistant City Manager effective at the end of August.

In 1998, Turner came to the City of Little Rock as Assistant Director of Public Works. He has over thirty years of administrative and engineering experience.

Much of that experience was from various positions in the City of

Springfield, MO. From 1993 to 1997, he was listed in *Who's Who in Finance and Industry*.

In March 2000, Turner was named as Director of Public Works. After guiding that department, he was picked by **Bruce Moore** to serve as Interim Assistant City Manager. In January 2003, Turner was promoted to Assistant City Manager.

In announcing Turner's retirement, Moore commented, "Bob's leadership has been instrumental in so many successes. From the resumption of residential solid waste service, to road construction, to the Clinton Library opening, Bob has played a part. He has also has been major factor in the ongoing success of the 2004 Capital Bond Program."

"Bob has a unique combination of skills," continued Moore. "Not only does he have a great mind for problem solving and paying attention to details, he also has a great heart for serving the citizens."

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FINANCE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES RECOGNITION

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) recently announced that the City of Little Rock has received the GFOA's Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for its budget.

The award represents a significant achievement by the City. It reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, the entity had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation.

These guidelines are designed to assess how well an entity's budget serves as: 1) A policy document, 2) A financial plan, 3) An operations guide, and 4) A communications device.

Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all four categories to receive the award. City Manager **Bruce Moore** stated, "We are pleased with the hard work done by the Finance Department. Finance Director **Bob Biles**, Budget Officer **LaVerne Duvall**, and the Finance staff do an outstanding job. It is nice to see them get recognized for their efforts."

When a Distinguished Budget Presentation Award is granted to an entity, a Certificate of Recognition for Budget Presentation is also presented to the individual or department as being primarily responsible for its having achieved the award. This has been presented to **Silas Roaf**, the Budget Management Analyst for the Finance Department. Last year, Duvall received the recognition.

Since the inception of the GFOA's Distinguished Budget Presentation Awards Program in 1984, approximately 900 entities have received the Award. Award recipients have pioneered efforts to improve the quality of budgeting and provide an excellent example of other governments throughout North America.

The Government Finance Officers Association is a nonprofit professional association serving 14,000 government finance professionals throughout North America. The GFOA's Distinguished Budget Presentation Awards Program is the only national award program in governmental budgeting.

Public Works Reminds Residents That Landscaping and Trees Are Not to Obscure STOP Signs

Landscaping and trees near street intersections frequently obscure traffic control signs. This can be dangerous to motorists and pedestrians. A driver who cannot see a "Stop" sign might proceed through an intersection into the path of oncoming traffic.

The City's Code (Section 32-8 – Obstructions to visibility at intersections) requires that owners of real property located at intersections maintain their property, including landscaping and trees, in a manner that does not obscure the visibility of traffic control signs. This is particularly critical for "Stop" and "Yield" signs.

According to **Nat Banihatti**, Traffic Engineer, "When Traffic Engineering is notified of such a situation, it is taken care of as soon as practical. However, assistance of property owners and residents is still needed with trimming of vegetation near such signs on a regular basis to preclude these problems."

City crews from Public Works Operations and Urban Forestery in Parks and Recreation will trim bushes and trees when they see an obscured sign. Problems with visibility of signs can be reported to Public Works at 918-3600.
