

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## **Firefighter Profile**

Q: What has surprised you the most about working as a Firefighter?

A: The gratification and self-satisfaction you feel by helping the citizens of Little Rock with anything from saving a life, to helping someone that has fallen and has no one to help them, to helping their pets out of dangerous situations or anyone that needs our help.

Q: What do you find most challenging about the fire service?

A: Keeping up with the new incident command, sector command, and new communication system, also with educating myself and my crew on the everyday hazards of modern day combustibles and chemicals.

Q: What do you wish other people knew about the Little Rock Fire Department?

A: I wish the citizens of Little Rock actually knew how much the firefighters study and train and prepare long before we have an incident and the importance of having newer fire apparatuses and the latest safety equipment.

Q: When your family and friends find out that you are a firefighter, what do they say or ask?

A: My family understands the FD way by growing up with it. My wife grew up with it. Her father, Capt. Bob Nordman and uncles, Chief Hoover, Capt. Lester Nordman, and Capt. Ed Lauderdale were all 20 yr. veteran. My friends think a firefighter is a special person and that I should know everything about most situations and will call on me for advice especially on injuries and safety around the house.

Q: Tell us about someone who has influenced your decision to work with the Little Rock Fire Department.

A: Capt. Bob Nordman first talked to me about becoming a firefighter when I was 21. He said I would make a good one. Being a 42 year veteran and a 32 year Captain, I would have to give credit first to the old heads that I came up with: Chief Charlie Burks, Chief G.W. Mahan, the Davis Chiefs (Jack, Curtis, Al), Capt. Bob Nordman, Capt. Brewczynski and Capt. Whaley. These are the ones that laid the foundation that I live by.

Q: What do you think will change about the LRFD over the next five (5) years?

## **Twenty-Three is Green (And We Have An Award to Prove It)**

You read that correctly. Station #23 is the first fire station in Arkansas to achieve LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification. There are many requirements for this certification. In cooperation with Viridian, a

consulting firm specializing in LEED Consulting and other green building projects, the City of Little Rock was able to build Station #23 to meet the exacting standards of the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC).

Completed in 2012, Station #23 meets LEED requirements for habitat, open space, energy and green power, construction waste and recycled and regional con-

tent, low-emitting and alternative transportation, and water use reduction and storm water:

- Habitat 56.1% of the project area uses native or adaptive vegetation;
- Open Space 74.72% of the site area is dedicated open space;
- Energy and Green Power the predicted annual energy consumption for the building is 154,895 kWh and 10,648 therms of natural gas;
- Construction Waste and Recycled and Regional



**Content** – 87% of total waste generated during construction was diverted from landfills while 13% of the materials used in construction contained recycled content and 31.1% of the total

building materials were found within 500 miles of the site;

• Low-Emitting and Alternative Transportation – interior paints and adhesives used contained low to no VOCs (Volatile Organic Compound) while low-emitting and fuel efficient vehicles have preferred parking spaces;

• Water Use Reduction and Stormwater – potable water use has been reduced by 35% and 90% of stormwater runoff is cap-

tured and treated to remove 80% of postdevelopment TSS (Total Suspended Solids).

In April of 2013 Station #23 was awarded LEED Certification. This certification was recognized at the Third Green Tie Awards Dinner, which was held on Thursday, September 25, 2014, at the Clinton Presidential Center. Among those in attendance were City Manager Bruce Moore, Mayor Mark Stodola, Chief Gregory Summers, Chief Douglas Coney, Paula Patterson, Sharon Forrester, Brittanyé Gyce, and Tabitha Cooke.
