

Public Safety Commission Meeting - 08/28/2025

Location: Willie L. Hinton Neighborhood Resource Center

Quorum: Yes (6 commissioners present)

Chair: Commissioner Gilbert

I. Opening Business

- Roll call taken. Commissioners Morshetti, Moffitt, Thompson, and Lopez were absent.
- Goals of the Public Safety Commission were recited.
- Recommendation made for future meetings to designate a single reader for efficiency.

II. Commissioner Comments

- Commissioner request: Take an official group photo to be posted on the city website.
- Consensus: No formal vote needed; will coordinate once all commissioners are present.
- **Commissioner Charles** circulated a copy of *Little Rock City Lifestyles* magazine to highlight community updates.

III. Staff Updates

- Christopher Harvey (Staff Liaison):
 - Welcomed commissioners and distributed lapel pins.
 - Noted that a **Board Report** must be submitted to the City Board of Directors by year-end.

 Acknowledged the subcommittees' active work and suggested possibly revising the report frequency currently stated in bylaws.

• Cody Pritchard (Senior Deputy City Attorney):

Present for legal questions; no opening comments.

IV. Chief of Police Report - Asst. Chief Andre Dyer

- **Crime update**: Crime rates are trending downward across all divisions.
- Caravanning enforcement: Success in mitigating loud, dangerous gatherings and associated violence.
- Rockefeller Elementary incident: Recent high-profile arrest showcased multi-division coordination.
- Curfew enforcement:
 - Reported as successful with minimal resistance.
 - Credited as a tool that empowered parents and protected youth.
- Mental health inquiry:
 - Clarified that a recent suspect showed no known mental illness but exhibited disturbing behavior.
 - Encouraged care in assuming diagnoses.

V. Old Business

- Adoption of July 17 meeting minutes:
 - Motion passed unanimously.
- **Follow-up**: Discussion on violence near Tangerine area concluded that the location has cooled down.

VI. New Business

Youth Violence Reduction & Prevention Subcommittee Report

- Key activities:
 - Youth citation data received and analyzed by category.
 - o Participation in GPI-related meetings and violence reduction forums.

- Noted Pine Bluff's 530-day youth homicide-free streak.
- Participated in "Addressing Violence in Pulaski County" event at Arkansas Baptist College.

Next Steps:

- Continue evaluating data and supporting youth outreach strategies.
- Explore collaboration with Pine Bluff officials.
- Develop a youth survey tool for local schools to assess safety concerns and needs by grade level.
- City efforts: Mayor Scott supports potential GPI (Group Violence Intervention) adoption for Little Rock, pending funding and partnership details with Pulaski County.

Stabilization Unit Update

- The County-operated CSU (Crisis Stabilization Unit) remains closed.
- Noted it was a valuable resource for police and community members.
- Plans to invite a representative from Pulaski County or Sheriff Higgins' office for an update at the next meeting.

VII. Special Presentation – Project HEAL (Hospital-based Violence Intervention Program at UAMS)

Presenters: Cindy Baker, Dr. Keela Lovely, Dr. Joshua Ellis

Overview:

- Project HEAL serves gunshot and violent assault survivors through a trauma-informed, peer-led model.
- Services include peer support, bedside intervention, group therapy, housing/employment assistance, and long-term follow-up.
- Focused on disrupting the cycle of violence by offering holistic recovery care and improving life outcomes.

Impact:

- Participants show reduced PTSD and depression symptoms.
- o Aims to influence wider social circles and reduce recidivism.

Needs:

- Additional funding and visibility to expand services.
- Greater collaboration with hospitals and city agencies.

Referral access across systems (especially Baptist Hospital).

• Commission Response:

- Expressed deep support for the program.
- Recognized lack of awareness about the initiative and committed to greater promotion.
- Agreed to help elevate the program's voice to city leadership.

- Action: Submit a letter of support from the Public Safety Commission to the Board of Directors.
- Include recommendation for Project HEAL to formally present at a future City Board meeting.
