A Message from the Director

On behalf of the Department of Housing & Neighborhood Programs (HNP), Happy New Year! We look forward to an exciting and productive year in 2019. The various functions and responsibilities of HNP are challenging; however, our staff stands ready to continue serving the citizens with great enthusiasm and vigor. The responsibilities of the department are quite expansive and contribute greatly to the quality of life in our various neighborhoods. During the past year, the department was involved in several activities and experienced many accomplishments. In the following paragraphs, I will highlight a few activities/accomplishments from 2018:

- Over 7,000 residents were provided healthcare services through the City's CDBG program with St. Vincent
- Over 7,600 meals were served through Meals on Wheels Program funded through our Community Development Division
- Over 2,900 pets were rescued or adopted through services at the Animal Village
- 4,884 3-1-1 requests were addressed by Animal Services
- 34,597 3-1-1 Service Requests were handled by code enforcement staff
- 3,528 weed lots were cut by HNP staff
- 129 properties were boarded and secured
- Over 3,600 people attended city-sponsored National Night Out events
- Our Community Service Coordinator supervised individuals that completed over 10,000 hours of community service work throughout the City

SOUTHWEST DIVISION QUARTERLY MEETING

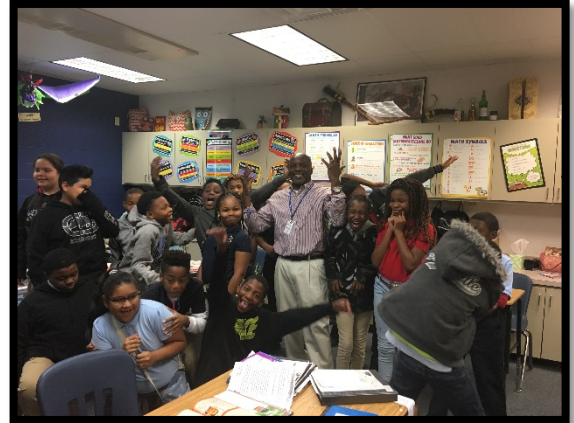
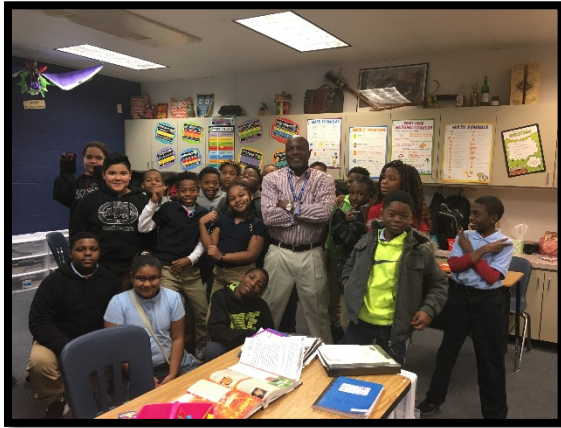

Although, Southwest was higher in Burglary/B&E., citywide, overall the Division had the lowest crime rate at 28.53% for the last three months. Captain Spriggs informed the crowd that some of the vehicles that were broken into were unlocked. The captain asked residents to remove valuables and lock their doors. Also, he asked residents not to leave vehicles running unattended.

Another Wonderful Year for Little Rock Animal Services

The year 2018 ended with a bang for the animals of the Animal Village. In December, a total of 179 dogs and cats, plus one rabbit were adopted. In addition, 83 dogs and cats were reclaimed by their owners or sent to rescue organizations. In total, 3,103 animals found new homes or were reunited with their owners. This is slightly below last year's total, but with 100 fewer animals entering the shelter, it resulted in a higher percentage of animals finding homes.

Friends of the Animal Village have continued to fundraise and sponsor adoption events, heartworm treatments, and full vetting services for all animals being transported or going to rescue organizations. In total, the organization has donated over \$100,000 in 2018 to care for the animals.

The continued success of the Animal Village is dependent upon volunteers helping to care for stray and unwanted animals of our city.
