

Little Rock Animal Village

Little Rock Animal Services is proud to announce 2019 is the third year in a row we have saved over 3,000 animals. What does the impact of this do to help our neighborhoods? That is over 9,000 dogs and cats in the last three years not reproducing. The number of animals coming into the Animal Village has decreased by over 25% in the last 10 years. Our plan has always been to make pets easy to adopt, knowing they would be spayed/neutered, and help us to reduce the number of unwanted litters.

2019 also saw us start a new program to microchip all animals adopted from the Animal Village. This is all paid for with donations and will alert us to any owned stray that originally come from the Village. A simple call and the owner can come and pick up their pet instead or animal waiting and not knowing if their owner will be coming.

Last year was the opening of the "Transport Quarantine Area" so we could hold the animals going to rescue away from those just coming in. This is to insure the health of the animals in our custody and ready for a ride to a new home. Last year was another wonderful year here at the Animal Village, we plan for 2020 to be our best year yet!

Did you know nine (9) out of ten (10) millennial renters want to purchase a home, but only 4.9% believe they will be able to do so in the next year. Many young adults cite home affordability issues as a key deterrent. In some cities, however, millennials are bucking this trend with higher rates of homeownership.

In its fifth annual study, SmartAsset.com uncovered where millennials are buying homes by analyzing millennial homeownership rates and the 10-year change in under-35 homeownership in 200 of the largest cities. 
